During the last week of Docember she observed a flock of 13 Audubon's) Warblers at Lake Tanglowood, While isolated birds of this species occur here in winter, it is very uncommon to see this many at one time. Ken Scyffort's winter study of birds in the Pale Dure Canyon has turned up two unusual species. On 1/1 he encountered a Winter Wren along the stream, and he saw it again on 1/9. Also on both of those dates he found the elusivo Baird's Sparrow. population of fringillids is very good on the study area this winter, possibly because of the abundant supply of wood and grass sceds. On the 31 acre plot the White-erowned Sparrows CALENDAR: are averaging 27 por trip, the Song Sparrows 21, Tree Sparrows 5, Lincoln's Sparrows 2, Whito-throated Sparrows 2, Rufous-crowned Sparrows 1, Oregon Juncos 39, Slate-celored Juncos 22, Cardinals 7, House Finches 1, Am. Goldfinches 6, and Pine Siskins 4. Two species notably absent are the Scaled Quail and the Bebwhite. One other netable observation was the Swamp Sparrow seen at Buffalo Lako on 12/23/71 by KS.
