It is with sorrow that we report the deaths of two of our loyal and founding members, Thelma Fox and B. W. VanNyy. Both contributed much to our knowledge of the birdlife of the Texas Panhandle and we all cherish fond memorys of pleasant days afield in their company.

BIRD NOTES:

Late winter can be an uneventful time for birders, what they call the "doldrums" but close attention to birdlife will in fact prove there is really no time that does not contain its own interest:

LOONS - FALCONS:

The movement of waterfowl presents an interesting mix at this time of year. Observers were quite excited over the 3 Tundra Swans seen on the Lake Meredith (west) Christmas Bird Count. Even more exciting were the 7 found on a playa lake north of Bushland, Potter Co., 2/27-3/2 (PA, VG, WG, RS). The Canada Goose pulled out early and the Snow Goose began arriving. The latter species is quite scarce in fall and winter but often passes through at yeat another location. Two males in considerable numbers on its way north in spring. First reports of it began ben 2/13 at Buffalo Lako NWR (KS) and there have been continued sightings (PA,KS,RS). One flock contained the very rare blue mopph of the Snow - a "Blue" goose (KS). It is interesting to note the changing composition of ducks as winter ends and spring begins. In mid and late January most ducks seen were Mallards. By mid-February Pintails become dominant and by early March American Wigeons are everywhere, along with an increasing number of Green-winged Teals. The raptor story continued of great interest. The last Bald Eagles reported were two north of Pampa in Gray Co. 3/5 (FE, JE). QUAIL - WOODPECKERS:

The Sandhill Cranes are on the move with many reported in Gray Co. (FE, JE), and the Killdeers have returned. Longbilled Dowitchers are not normally reported in our area until late March or , early April but this year 2 were found on a playa lake south of Umbarger, Randall Co. on 3/6 (PA,KS). This sighting beats by one day the previous earliest sighting made in 1974.

PASSERINES:

A sure sign of spring is a swallow and a very early sighting this year was of a Tree Swallow at Buffalo Lake NWR 2/27 (KS). The earliest sighting of this species was on 2/26/56. Has anyone seen any Mountain Bluebirds? A drive acrosss the plains at this time of year usually produces many perched on high lines and fences, but not this year. The Pyrrhuloxia has turned up were found at Buffalo Lake NWR 2/13 (PA, KS) and one again on 2/27 (KS). After moving south during our heavy snowfalls, the longspurs are back. Large numbers of McCown's have been seen and most unusual, Chestnut-collareds were observed perched on fence lines on 2/13 (PA,KS). Rarely or ever do you see a longspur perched on antthing except the ground. The wintering flock of Great-tailed Grackes has not busted up yet and its members gone their paired ways. The flock continues moving mornings and evenings between its
