BIRD NOTES: June-August

Double-crested Cormorant, Yellow Warbler: in western Lipscomb County on the late date of 6/6 (KS).

Yellow-crowned Night-Heron: an adult and juvenile at Buffalo Lake NWR, Randall County, 8/5 (KS).

Canada Goose: a mallard-size bird on the Bookout farm near Hartley, Hartley County, to at least 7/2 (JB,CC,KS). Photos taken and sent to the Texas Photo-Record File at Texas A&M (JB).

<u>Peregrine Falcon</u>: one circling around the upper floors of the Texas American Bank building in dowtown Amerillo, Potter County, 8/5 (RR,EA). Only one other August record on file.

Common Moorhen: adults with juveniles in cattail marsh downriver from Sanford Dam, Lake Meredit, Hutchinson County, 7/6 (KS). This species has apparently taken up residence at this location. Not many years ago it was considered a rare event to see one anywhere in the Panhandle.

Western Sandpiper, Stilt Sandpiper: in southwestern Ochiltree County on the late date of 6/7 (KS).

Red Knot: one at Buffalo Lake NWR, Randall County, 7/8 (KS), and three near Kingsmill, Gray County, 8/26 (KS). All the birds were in winter plumage and one was tagged with what looked like a US Fish & Wildlife Service band on the right leg.

Red-necked Phalarope: two on the Hollywood Road Waste Water Treatment lake, Randall County, 8/17 (PA).

Rufous, Broad-tailed, and Black-chinned Hummingbirds: all reported in the Ross's yard in Amarillo, Randall County, week of 8/5-11 (RR, EA).

Olive-sided Flycatcher (1), Western Wood Pewee (3), Willow Flycather (1), Swainson's Thrush (1), and MacGillivray's Warbler (1); all in the Thompson Grove Picnic Area near Texline, Dallam County, on the late date of 6/9 (KS).

Olive-sided Flycatcher: first returning migrant reported in Amarillo, Randall County, 8/7 (RR, EA).

Empidona Flycatcher: first returning migrants reported at Jim's Lake near Borger, Hutchinson County, 7/21 (FC,FS), and in west Amarillo, Potter County, 7/21 (PA).

Canyon Wren: an out of pocket bird seen and neard singing inside the 84 Lumber Company building in west Amarillo, Potter County, 7/20 (PA).

Louisiana Waterthrush: the find of the summer - one reported at Jim's Lake near Borger, Hutchinson County, 7/21 (FC) - the only summer sighting on record.

Following a cool front Sept. 2nd many fall migirants are coming through.
Rena Ross' yard has been full of robins, orioles, olive sided flycathers, western wood pence and both ast throated and go creasted flycathers.

Peggy Acord has had a considerabe movement of chipping sparrow and yellow and Wilson's Warbler on Sept. 2.
