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PROGRAM FOR JANUARY:

The montly meeting of the TPAS will be held at 7:30 p.m., January 19, at the Garden Center. Joe Krai, fisheries biologist with the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, will present a program on the various projects the Department is currently engaged in.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS:

What was most noteworthy were the ideal weather conditions. The Buffalo Lake count may have been a little breezy but, lordy, nothing in comparison with some we have had. This is the second year in a row for good weather and I am afraid we are getting spoiled.

Amarillo (Palo Duro Canyon) - the Merlin is not often recorded on our counts and the two here were most unusual. The Common Moorhen downstream from the dam at Tanglewood represents only the second sighting for the count as does the Carolina Chickadee in the State Park. Northern Cardinals have rarely been found in such profusion and the 98 House Finches, 53 all in a row, are the most ever for the count. The rare Winter Wren and Fox Sparrow are always nice ones to find. Most glaringly absent were the turkeys!

Buffalo Lake NWP - the only noteworthy sighting here was the American Bittern, only the second one ever recorded on the count. Most obviously absent was a wider variety of ducks - the water was there behind Stewart Dike but not the ducks. Also scarce were the longspurs. The count will not post the high count in the nation for McCown's this year.

<u>Lake Meredith(west)</u> - without question the species of the count was the two Lark Sparrows, only the third winter sighting ever for the Panhandle, and the first for so far north. The 29 Western Bluebirds were unusual in themselves and certainly so for outnumbering the Easterns and Mountains by such a margin. Again, the cardinals were in very good numbers and the turkeys and Bald Eagles made a good showing. This count also had its Winter Wren.

Quitaque (Caprock Canyons) - new for the Park and the county was the Red-bellied Woodpecker (photos taken by Joel Reese). Most gratifying for such large numbers were the Canvasbacks (105) and the Mountain Bluebirds (341) - you can never see too many Mountain Bluebirds. Here again we had the rare Winter Wren, three this time, and more Fox Sparrows.

Lake Meredith(east) - a count of superlatives in the form of 3,000,000 blackbirds, and one Turkey Vulture! The TV represents only the second winter sighting on record for the Panhandle, the first for January (the Askins, Cain, Stallwitz party had the honours). Other very good birds were the Eared Grebe, Double-crested Cormorant, Sora (identified by sound), Northern Shrike, and Swamp Sparrow.

BIRD NOTES:

- Dec. 2: Green-tailed Towhee one at the Scott residence in southwest Amarillo (PS) that appears to have set up there for the winter a rare winter sighting.
- Dec. 6: Oldsquaw still present on the Triangle Ponds along the Claude highway east of Lake Tanglewood (DA,CB,DM), and last seen 12/14 (KS). An American Bittern was found at Stewart Dike, Buffalo Lake NWR (DA,CB,DM) for one of the very few winter records, and it was seen again on 12/14 (KS). Both an adult and immature Northern Shrike were found at Buffalo Lake (DA,CB,DM), and an immature again on 12/14 (KS).
- Dec. 11: Sandhill Crane large numbers were reported between Pampa and Amarillo, particularly in Carson Co. (FE & JE), along with Snow Geese.
- Dec. 14: Wilson's Phalarope two bobbing and spinning on the sewage ponds (Elysian Fields) the only winter record on file (KS). Our latest date was 10/28. Also seen were two Yellow-headed Blackbirds later in the day (DM).
- Dec. 26: White Pelican one at Lake MacKenzie, Briscoe Do (JR) only our fifth Panhandle winter sighting,
- Dec. 28: 80-100 Chihuahuan Ravens were seen in Dallam Co. along with 14 Common Ravens (FC, DM).

 The swing through the northern Panhandle also produced two Merlins, many Rough-legged Hawks, and three White-fronted Geese and some 900 Snow Geese an Etter Pond in Moore Co.
- Jan. 4-5: Hooded Merganser three males and two females on Thompson Park Lake, Amarillo (PA,DW).

In addition, two <u>Black-crested Titmice</u> appear to have taken up residence in Hereford, the first time the species has been reported in Deaf Smith Co. (TR), and an <u>Inca Dove</u> was reported in Panhandle, Carson Co., in December (<u>fide PA</u>).
